

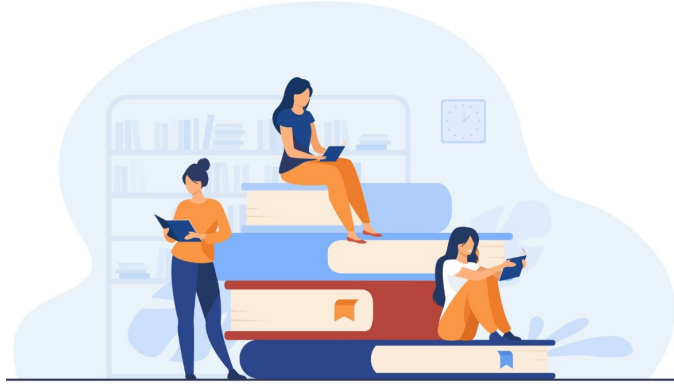

User Flow: Adding Multiple Books

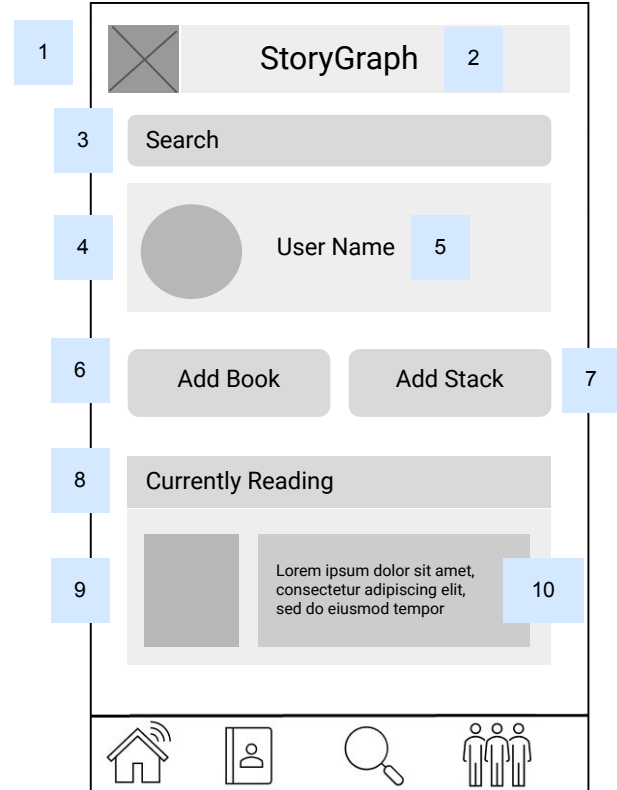


The user wants to add all of the books in their collection to their StoryGraph account so that they can better connect with readers with similar interests. They don't want to add every book one by one, so they use the 'Add a stack' feature to take a picture of all of their books and have them added to their account.

User Flow: Adding Multiple Books

On the user's profile page, they click the 'Add Stack' button to begin the process of adding multiple books.

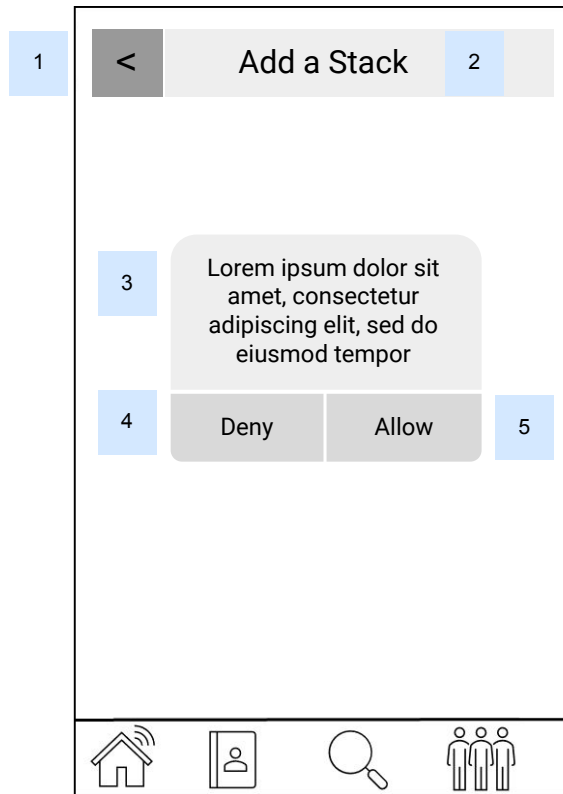
1. Image: StoryGraph icon
2. Header: App title, should be in a larger font than the rest of the app
3. Search bar: Should search the app for books, authors, book genres, or other users
4. Image: The user's profile picture, should be a grey circle if no profile picture has been added
5. Text: Should display the current user's name or username
6. Button: Labelled 'add book' when clicked will take the user to the UI to add a single book to their app
7. Button: Labelled 'add stack'. When clicked will take the user to the UI to add multiple books at once
8. Header: Title of the 'currently reading' card
9. Image: Should display an image of the cover of the book
10. Text: Should display a text description of the book. If no description is available, should only display the title



User Flow: Adding Multiple Books

If the app has not accessed the user's camera before, a dialog box will appear giving the user the option to deny or allow the app access to the camera.

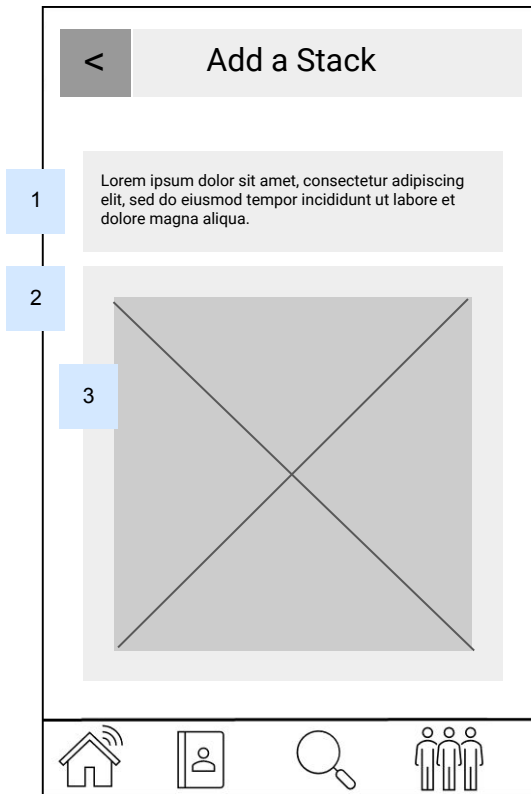
1. Button: Labelled with a back arrow. Should take the user to the previous screen
2. Header: Feature title, should be in a larger font than the rest of the text
3. Text: Should ask the user for permission to access their phone camera in order to add a book stack
4. Button: Labelled 'Deny' when clicked will take the user back to the previous screen and will not give the StoryGraph app access to the user's camera
5. Button: Labelled 'Allow'. When clicked will give the StoryGraph app permission to access the phone camera and will direct the user to the screen to add a book stack



User Flow: Adding Multiple Books

The user lines up their phone camera so that their physical stack of books is contained within the rectangle on screen.

1. Text: Should display instructions on how to use the camera to add multiple books to your StoryGraph account
2. Display: Should show everything visible by the user's camera. Used to take a photo of the user's stack of books.
3. Overlay: A colored overlay on the user's camera screen. Used to how they should aligned their books on the screen. When books are aligned should move to the next screen.



User Flow: Adding Multiple Books

The user is able to review all of the books that the app found and mark if they have finished the book, if they recommend the book, or if the book has been incorrectly added.

1. Text: Should display how many books the app found in the previous photo
2. Header: The title of the first book found in the photo
3. Button: Should delete the book from the list when clicked
4. Image: Should display an image of the cover of the book. If no image is available, will display a gray rectangle
5. Button: When clicked, the user is able to apply a rating the the book. If left unclicked, the book will be marked as 'unrated'
6. Button: Labelled 'Recommend'. When clicked, will change color and add the book to the user's recommended list.
7. Button: Labelled 'Finished'. When clicked, will change color and add the book the user's list of finished books.
8. Button: Labelled 'Add Books'. When clicked, will add all books displayed above to the user's account.



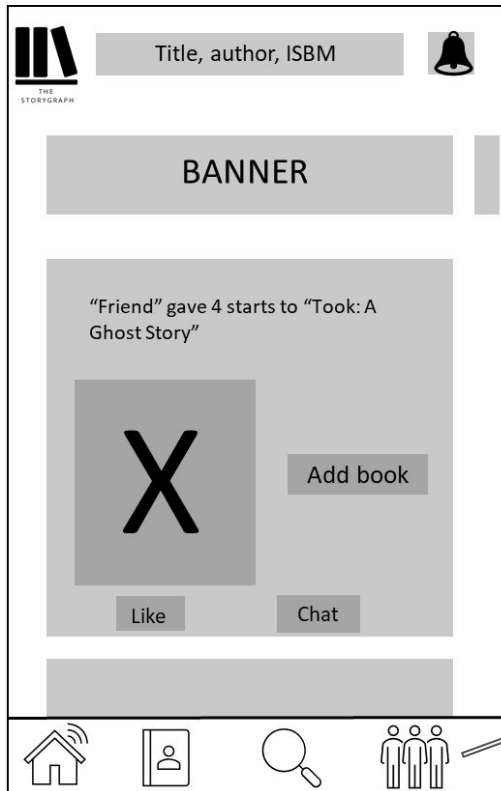
User Flow: Finding a Group



The user wants to connect with like-minded readers on The StoryGraph app to build a community. To achieve this, we've proposed adding additional community features. The user decides she want to join a group of people who like reading horror. The user flow looks like this:

User Flow: Finding a Group

The user is able to drill into the Community page to find a list of community features she can engage in.



The banners across the top of the home page will include information and call to action for community features

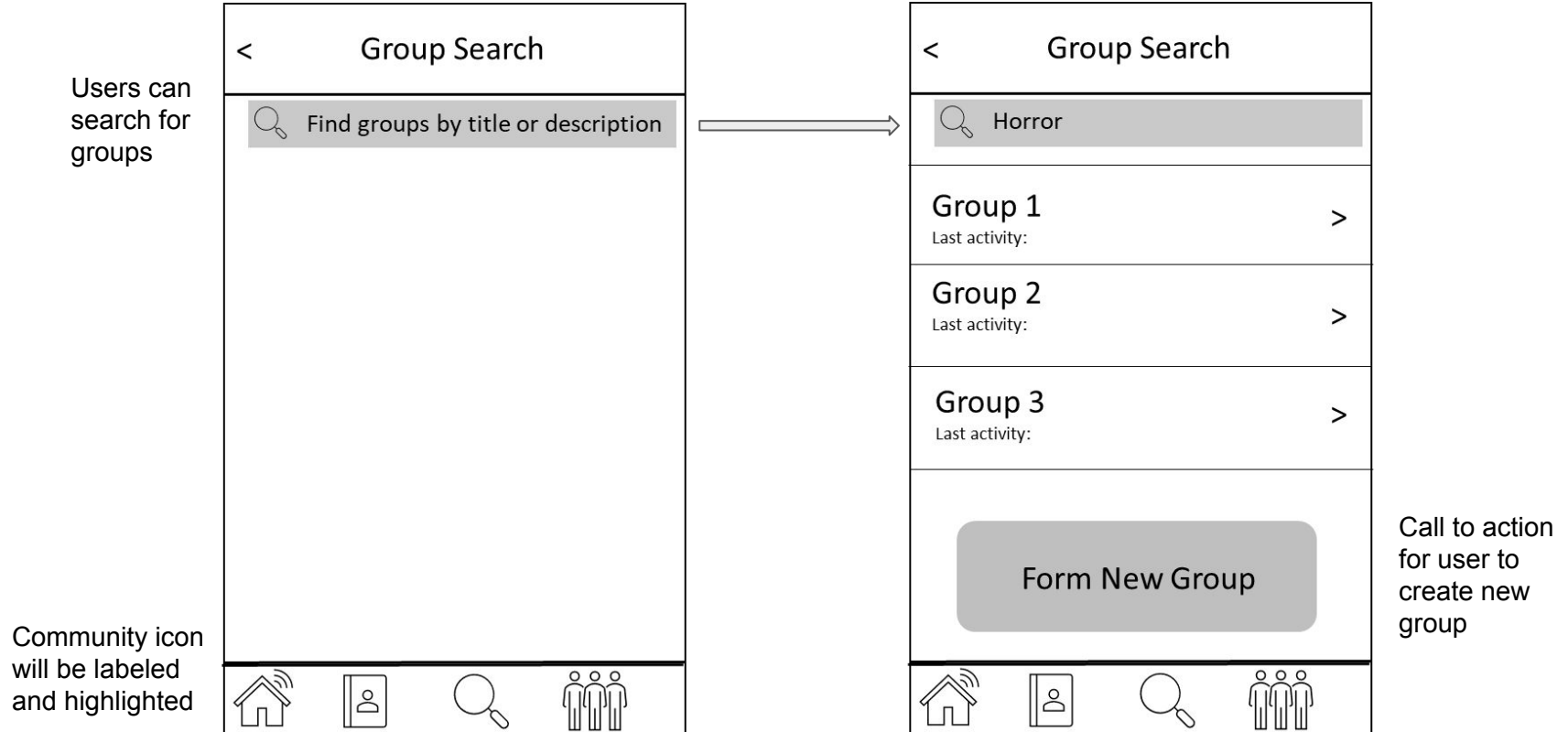
Users can add the book to their bookshelves

The user selects “Groups” and is taken into a Group Search page, where she can then search for already existing groups that are horror-themed. She also has the option to form a new group.



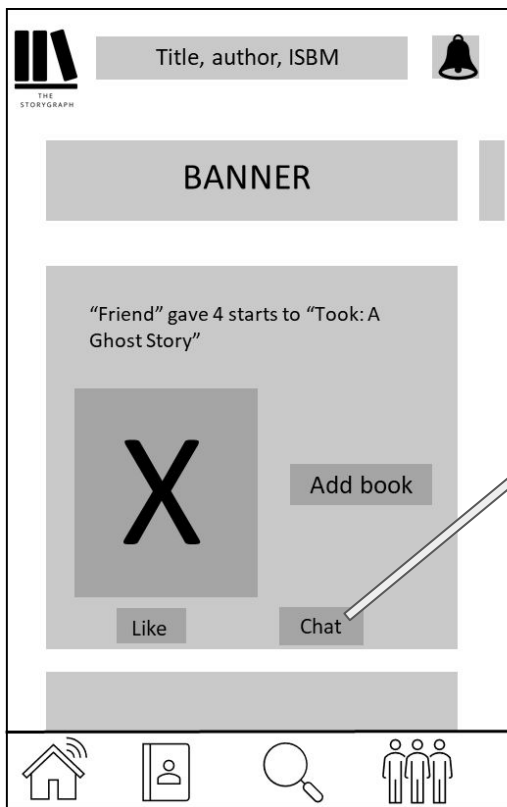
User Flow: Chatting with a Member



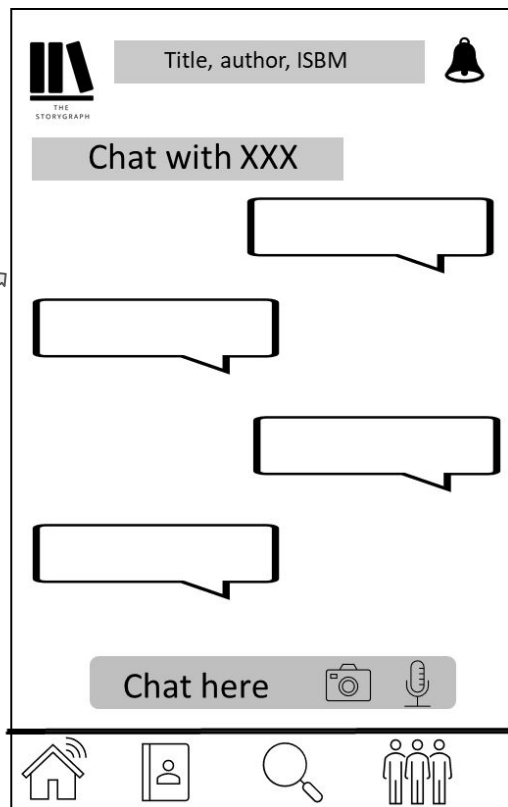
The user notices a friend recently read the same book as her and rated it. She wants to chat with him. The user flow looks like this:

The user selects "Chat" from the banner showing a friend recently rated a book. She opens the chat window to talk with him about his rating.



The user can like a rating, or initiate chat



User can drill into notifications here
